WALKING ON WATER

Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid."

Matthew 14:27

During an especially cold winter, I ventured out to Lake Michigan, the fifth largest lake in the world, to see it frozen over. Bundled up on the beach where I usually enjoy soaking up the sun, the view was breathtaking. The water was actually frozen in waves creating an icy masterpiece. Because the water was frozen solid next to the shore, I had the opportunity to "walk on water." Even with the knowledge that the ice was thick enough to support me, I took the first few steps tentatively. I was fearful the ice wouldn't continue to hold me. As I cautiously explored this unfamiliar terrain, I couldn't help but think of Jesus calling Peter out of the boat onto the Sea of Galilee.

When the disciples saw Jesus walking on the water, their response was also fear. But Jesus responded, "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid" (Matthew 14:26–27). Peter was able to overcome his fear and step out onto the water because he knew Jesus was present. When his courageous steps faltered because of the wind and waves, Peter cried out to Jesus. INSIGHT

The fact that Jesus Christ walked on water carries with it a powerful message about His deity. In John's gospel Christ refers to Himself as the great "I am" (John 6:35, 48; 8:12, 58; 9:5; 10:9, 11; 11:25; 14:6; 15:1). Biblical theologians see these "I am" statements as clear references to the divine name revealed to Moses at the burning bush. When Moses asked God by what name He should be called, He answered: "I am who I am. This

is what you are to say to the Israelites: 'I am has sent me to you' " (Exodus 3:14).

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Yarn Wrapped Carrot

Materials: orange acrylic wool, cardboard, green or natural wood clothespins (if you will be using natural wood ones, you will need to color those too), scissors, white school glue (optional)

1.-Draw a carrot shape on the cardboard and cut it out. If young kids will be working on this project we recommend the adult does all the cutting.

> 2.- While you cut the carrot shapes, kids can color the clothespins (be mindful that some paints can "glue" the clothespins together). We recommend using pre-colored clothespins or coloring them with markers or even ink pads.

3.- To make this project a bit easier for younger kids, cut into the carrot shape a few times, so that the kids can push the yarn inside – this will make the wrapping process more young kid friendly.

4.-Wrap the yarn around the carrot shape a few times. If you want, you can add a bit of white school glue onto the cardboard (but it can get a bit messy – which too is fun).

5.- Now it's time to wrap the orange yarn all around and around.

Keep on wrapping until you are happy with how your yarn carrot craft is looking. Tie a knot.

Sabbath School Missions 2nd Quarter, 2018

This quarter the North American Division, which oversees the SDA Church's work in the USA, Canada, the French possessions of St. Pierre and Miquelon, the British overseas territory of Bermuda, the US territories of Guam, Wake Island, and Northern Mariana Islands in the Pacific Ocean, and three nearby states in free associations with the US – Palau, the Marshall Islands, and the Federated States of Micronesia, will be the focus of the 13 Sabbath offerings and the featured mission stories. This region is home to 691 million people, including 1.2 million Adventists. That's a ratio of one Adventist for nearly 300 people.

This quarter's 13th Sabbath projects are in the US state of Arizona, in the Canadian prov8ince of Alberta, and on the Ebeye Island in the Marshall

Islands, and they share one thing: Adventist education.

In Arizona, the funds will help construct a new gym and cafeteria – the New Life Center – at Holbrook SDA Indian School. The school is 72 years old, and the current gym is falling apart, with an uneven floor and insulation sticking out of the ceiling. One of the students there shared that they were worried that the dilapidated building cast his new faith in a poor light among the many Native American families who attend community events there.

In Alberta, the Mamawi Atosketan Native School will receive funds to expand its educational program, particularly among high school students.

On Ebeye Island, the Ebeye SDA School will carry out urgent repairs on its 3-story building. Walls are crumbling after being built with cement mixed with saltwater during serious drought in 1987. The governments of the Marshall Islands and Japan have contributed generously toward the repairs, and the 13th Sabbath Offering will help finish the work.

The Conference is requiring us to have a Safety drill, so next week the 31st we will have a FIRE **DRILL.** We will have the evacuation chart as a bulletin insert. One for upstairs and downstairs will be posted on the bulletin board and posted both upstairs & downstairs. Next week we will be organized, and will let you know how to systematically evacuate the church in case of a "fire in a specific location". Of course if the real fire later is somewhere else and we are in another part of the church we would need to be aware of what to do also.

"This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? The ordeal was almost over when Johnny's brave little voice broke the silence, "Say, Doc, when do I die?"

It was only then that the doctor realized what the moment of hesitation, the trembling of the lip, had meant earlier. Little Johnny actually thought that in giving his blood to his sister he was giving up his life! And in that brief moment, he had made his great decision!
